Bras Basah is an area rich in culture and tradition, boasting museums, art centres, and even religious sites. There are also great places to get food here, though, which is why it's best to start this tour in the late morning, so you truly enjoy the Bras Basah dining experience too!

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Bras Basah gets its name from the Malay term for "wet rice". That's because rice used to be laid out on the banks of the Bras Basah River (which you now know as the Stamford Canal).

Today, Bras Basah is a culturally significant neighbourhood, with locations as the National Museum of Singapore and the Armenian Church, which is a national monument.

It's probably little wonder, given that Sir Stamford Raffles himself originally earmarked this to serve as Singapore Town's European district. A good bit of history and development for the country took place here, which is why history buffs are in for a treat with this tour!





# Admire the visual arts at the National Design Centre



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This is among the most-visited temples in Singapore, where visitors pray to Kuan Yin or the Goddess of Mercy. It's also among the oldest in the area, having sat here since 1884.

The temple has seen a lot, as such, from serving as a refuge in World War II to being rebuilt in 1982 in order to accommodate the rising number of worshippers.

You'll find most of its visitors coming on the 1st or 15th day of Chinese New Year, with crossworshippers even coming to it from the Hindu temple nearby!

### About the Sri Krishnam Hindu Temple

Yes, this is the Hindu temple we just mentioned. We grouped these two locations together because they're right next to each other and their visitors have been crossworshipping at the two spots for decades!

The Sri Krishnan Temple goes all the way back to 1870, which actually makes it older than the temple next door to it. It's been renovated as well, and like the other temple, sees peak worshipper numbers around Chinese New Year.

Of special note is that it's been gazetted as a national monument. It's also the only South Indian temple in the country that's dedicated to Krishna and his consort Rukmini.

## 6 Goon the hunt for street art

Waterloo Street, Queen Street and Armenian Street Street art is all over Bras Basah. It's wonderfully representative of the local culture, which tends to be young and high-energy in those areas.

Check out the rotating art at The Substation or pieces like the RSCLS work commissioned by the National Heritage Board at the carpark next to the Peranakan Museum.

Or just amble along Waterloo Street, Queen Street, and Armenian Street to spot samples. You can even find some within the Bras Basah Complex itself!

The Maghain Aboth Synagogue goes all the way back to 1878, making it one of the oldest extant Jewish buildings in the region! The name means "Shield of Our Fathers", and the building is a neoclassicalcolonial architectural hybrid - definitely worth a visit!

You do have to book a tour if you want to visit it, though. And if you're there for prayer, note that Shacharit is at 7:30am daily (8am Sunday & Public Holidays) while Mincha is at 6:45pm. The former is followed by breakfast; the latter, by Arvit.
